## Multiply

# Woodbury Lutheran at 50 The Year of Jubilee

It was August 1, 1967, when Paul and Rhoda Pfothenauer arrived in Woodbury with their two small children. (Tom, their youngest, would not arrive for another 10 years.) Woodbury, newly incorporated that same year, was a sleepy little mostly rural community of 900 people.

They settled into the new Royal Oaks neighborhood, a small area of tidy homes being built in the shadow of the growing 3M Company. Rhoda remembers there were no people, no shopping, no restaurants. Just, from her vantage point, lots of cornfields. Paul began the arduous task of knocking on doors and trying to establish a new LCMS church by reaching out to people one-by-one.

The stories of his showing up on the front steps of these new homes before the moving van was unloaded gave him a reputation as a bold, albeit slightly over-eager, evangelist, ready to tell people about Jesus Christ and His love for them.

The first minutes of the young church recorded the initial meeting of (primarily) Paul and Rhoda's neighbors, who would become the church's original members. After eating together, the men stayed in the living room upstairs to work on a charter, while Rhoda and the women retired to another room to discuss missions.

From these humble beginnings around a table of fellowship and the visionary resolve of a young pastor and his wife has grown a church of nearly 4,000 members, with four campuses, and four worship venues, with a local mission field of more than 100,000 people in the East Metro area.

What could that early church, named Woodbury Lutheran to reflect its commitment to the little town in which it was settled, have in common with Woodbury Lutheran today? And what will it have in common with the church in another 50 years?

Maybe everything.

Because, while upon casual observation we may think much has changed, the heart of Woodbury Lutheran has not.

From our early beginnings in the gymnasium at Royal Oaks Elementary, to the grafting of the congregation at Oak Hill, to (in a twist of irony) the worship services on our newest campus at Liberty Ridge Elementary, it is not the buildings but the people who are Woodbury Lutheran.

When the doors opened on Valley Creek Campus in 1969, church leadership decided the building would always be a place of gathering not just for Sunday worship, but for community events. Through the years, it has been a busy place for gatherings of all sorts. In addition to our preschool program, which opened soon after the original building was dedicated, and the Christian Cupboard, we host Bible Study

Fellowship, recovery groups, dance recitals, school concerts, scout meetings, blood drives, and more. Today, the building on Valley Creek houses about 100 non-church meetings each month.

And one of the people in our neighborhood said he bought the house across the street because he assumed a church would be a quiet neighbor, except for Sunday mornings!

Our first focus as a congregation is on worship. From the Chicago Folk Service in the 1960s, to the music of Matt Redman and Chris Tomlin, among others, we have always reflected changing musical preferences of the time while honoring tradition through both contemporary and blended services. Anchoring it all has been preaching centered on God's word, and prayer. Lots and lots of prayer!

We value and emphasize growth – not corporate growth, but individual spiritual growth. We have encouraged children and adults of all ages to be in the Word, to attend worship, to join small groups and Bible studies that will challenge them and develop in them Godly wisdom. While we may not have identified it as such years ago, we have always encouraged our members to walk a Discipleship path.

As we stretch beyond our walls, and sometimes beyond ourselves, to answer the needs of our immediate community, our city, and the world, we have built a reputation as a serving and sending church. From 6,000 quilts that cover the backs of those who go through the doors at the Salvation Army shelter ... to a million meals (and counting) for Feed My Starving Children ... and so much more ... the hands of our people are busy as we reflect the love of Jesus.

Our vision for mission, which started at the first meeting, continues through supporting, sending and equipping missionaries, many of whom are children raised within our congregation. God has been faithful to us – from generation to generation!

There have been changes, but our cornerstone remains the same. Woodbury Lutheran is built on a firm foundation -- the truth of the Gospel and our adherence to scripture as God-breathed has not wavered. And it is our desire to share the love of Jesus Christ, and to reflect His heart for retrieving the lost, that was from the beginning -- and is still -- the mission of our congregation.

As we begin our 50th anniversary launch of a new campaign, "Multiply," it is our prayer that the work which began 50 years ago – outreach to those in our community and far beyond in the name of Jesus Christ -- will always be what unites us and inspires us.

## OAK HILL UPDATES


*Here are some quick updates from our Oak Hill Campus:*

# Share Your Thanksgiving Day with a Foreign Student

Janice and I had the opportunity over Thanksgiving in 2016 to host two Chinese students from the University of Minnesota at our family Thanksgiving meal. This was arranged through a program called USA Homestays.

Why did we agree to do this on a traditionally family day? Apparently, 90% of students from foreign countries that study in the US never set foot in an American home. If our [now-grown] children Ashleigh or Nic were studying in another country, I would hope that someone would invite them to experience local traditions.

We hosted two students whose English names are Cheryl and Jimmy. They were great guests to have. Their English skills were very good (certainly better than our Chinese!).

We didn't do anything different than we normally would. We prayed over our meal, we worked on a jigsaw puzzle, we watched some football on TV, we played pool and board games, and our student guests participated in everything.

At the end of the evening as we said our goodbyes

before I took them back to campus, Cheryl said to Janice “Is it OK to hug you?” Those of you who know Janice know her response. These are students who are spending multiple years away from their families - we were honored to be able to be “family away from home.”

We enjoyed the time so much that we invited both students to join us for Christmas Day. Jimmy was in China over break, so wasn't able to join us, but Cheryl and another student, Mark, did. Cheryl also joined our whole family the next day as we did a glass fusion craft.

We didn't realize what a great experience this would be. I encourage you to consider opening your home to a student over Thanksgiving. It's a great experience - and you have the opportunity to make an impact in the lives of students that may not be familiar with our customs and be-

liefs. The majority of foreign students are from China, India, and Saudi Arabia. Be open to learning about their cultures, because we found they certainly like to learn about ours!

USA Homestays provides some training in advance of your hosting a student to give you some ideas of what to expect and what you should or shouldn't do.

Please let me know if you have any questions about hosting a student - or two - over Thanksgiving. It's a great experience for the student - and it will be a great experience for you and your family!

# The Beckendorf's Mission Update

A written Bible without a literate community  
is just an artifact on a shelf.

That may sound a bit pessimistic but it is the reality on the ground. For years we have been working diligently to translate God's Word into Khwedam and hoping that along the way "someone" would come along to begin teaching people to read and write Khwedam. We had conducted some literacy workshops years ago in conjunction with a local non-government-organization; we provided the knowledge of the language and its writing, and the NGO provided the logistics and funding. However, when the NGO's funding fizzled so did the literacy work. At the time the people in the villages weren't too upset because there was nothing to read. But now that we've been producing selections of Scripture there is a renewed hunger for literacy.

Toward the end of 2016, as we were planning for 2017, we decided that we had put off literacy work long enough and made a plan to begin teaching. Splash and I (Tim) developed some new materials and refined others that we had created some years ago to use for literacy engagement and practice. Then we began producing more literature. We produced several health booklets that addressed good hygiene, tuberculosis, alcoholism and vaccinations. Moses also wrote a number of Khwedam fables that everyone knows, adding drawings to illustrate the characters. These are becoming very popular with those who already read Khwedam. The purpose of producing these booklets is for the people to have literature to read in order to develop their new reading skills (as well as to impart information).

Moses and Splash have visited Khwe communities in Botswana, Namibia, and South Africa teaching reading and writing in Khwedam. These sessions have been hugely successful and already those who received training are reading and beginning to write in Khwedam and are urgently requesting that Splash and Moses return to give follow up training.

All of this takes a lot of time away from Bible translation, but is necessary so that the Bible we are producing will be used. We ask that you would please pray that literacy will dramatically grow among the Khwe and that it will significantly increase their knowledge of salvation as they read God's Word in Khwedam.

# WALK ON WATER

**We live in a culture obsessed with obtaining the most comfortable lifestyle.** God commands us to comfort others, but we would rather comfort ourselves. We even have comfort foods! Comfort isn't necessarily bad, but our ultimate comfort should not be dependent upon things or circumstances but rather upon God.

As we follow Jesus, we discover that He is not as concerned with our continual comfort as much as we are. God is more concerned with our character. God knows that discomfort actually has the potential to help us grow closer to Him, to depend on Him, and it allows God to show Himself strong on our behalf. God tests us, stretches us, and shapes us in uncomfortable ways—ways we would never choose for ourselves. Jesus often led His disciples out of their comfort zone and into uncomfortable, even dangerous, situations.

**One night, Jesus sent Peter and the other disciples away in a small boat, knowing that a raging storm was on its way.** Jesus came to them like a ghost, walking on the dark water in the middle of the sea, unmoved by the wind and the waves. To prove He was Jesus, He instructed Peter to get out of the boat and walk on the water toward Him. This was an ultimate out-of-the-comfort-zone moment! Peter's obedience and quick faith allowed him to walk on the water, but fear almost drowned him when he took his focus off of Jesus.

**Jesus used discomfort to show His miraculous power that night.** Jesus and Peter walked on water, Jesus rescued Peter and the other disciples, Jesus calmed the storm, and He accepted their worship. When we obey God's voice, take steps of faith outside of our comfort zone, and focus on Jesus, miracles can happen. If we recognize Jesus as God, we can trust Him in any situation. Jesus is our Comforter. He has saved us. Jesus deserves our trust and our worship, regardless of our circumstances.

## HEAR IT

**Read Matthew 14:22-33 with your family.** Imagine being one of the disciples in the boat. Discuss the following questions and talk about how this story relates to your lives today.

- If Jesus knew the disciples would be caught in a storm why do you think He sent them out that night?
- Was Peter comfortable walking on the water? Why did Peter start to sink?
- What happened when Jesus got in the boat? What changed?
- What do you think the disciples learned that night? What can you learn from this story?

## DO IT

**Challenge yourself this month to do something out of your comfort zone that you know would be pleasing to God.** True that even if you are uncomfortable, Jesus will show up and uphold you. Suggestions:

**Ask** someone (maybe a neighbor) if there is anything he needs prayer for, and if he does, pray for him right then and there.

**Compliment** someone you think needs some encouragement or as uncomfortable as it might be, say, "I love you" to a family member who needs to hear it.

**Look** intently for opportunities to help someone. When you see an opportunity, no matter your comfort level, go for it—just like Peter jumping out of the boat!

**Invite** someone to go to church with you. Or maybe join that person for an event she would enjoy that you may not.




