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Some Changes and Some Sameness in Youth Ministry

As we look ahead to fall and a new year of ministry programming you'll notice some changes in how we do youth ministry at Woodbury Lutheran. You'll also notice a lot of things are staying the same.

Please know that we work continuously to better our Youth Ministry Program. We have a deep love for middle and high school students, a never-ending desire to share with them the truth of a God who has called them by name and who gives salvation in Jesus, and faith in the power of the Holy Spirit to work in all of us.

Research shows that as students mature it becomes more and more important that they identify with the larger body of believers, not just with their age group. Worshiping and Serving alongside generations of believers gives students a wider perspective and experience of what being a disciple of Jesus looks like. Worship and Serve are lifelong practices that need experience and nurture. We want to give our students time and space to develop these practices as they prepare to become adult disciples of Jesus. As part of our new program the 6th-12th grade students will Worship and Serve on Sunday mornings. Experiences to help them Grow will take place on Wednesday nights.

Small groups will continue to be our primary focus when it comes to the Grow piece of the Discipleship Path. You've heard us say, "Life is better together." That's for all ages. On Wednesday evenings WLC's campuses will still be full of students gathering for biblical and practical large group teaching followed by small groups gathering to learn how to live as disciples today. Middle School (6th-8th grade) Foundations and High School (9th-12th grade) Roots will continue to provide growth in community. We grow better in circles than in rows. An evening gathering gives time to develop relationships and connect with one another and with God on a deep level.

What about Confirmation? At Woodbury Lutheran and across our church body the practice has been that students begin the confirmation preparation process at 7th grade. It lasts for a prescribed amount of time, in our case two school years plus September and October of a third year. Beginning this Fall, students who are 1) between 7th and 12th grade, 2) committed to being a part of a small group in Foundations or Roots, and 3) ready to begin this process may opt in to Confirmation. Students will receive a take-home study guide that will lead them through Luther's Small Catechism. This guide has been carefully created to be used by the students with their parents. There will be lessons on how to use the Bible, lessons on spiritual practices, information about what it means to be a Lutheran Christian, and information about how to share their faith story. When they've completed the study guide, with check-ins along the way from the youth staff and their small group leaders, they will make a public confirmation of their faith during a worship service.

Why the change? Not every student, upon entering the 7th grade, is developmentally ready to take on a more in-depth study and exploration of the Christian faith. *Teaching the Faith at Home* (David L. Rueter, St. Louis: Concordia, 2016, p. 78) says this, "We must remember that the Holy Spirit works the individual desire to make such a commitment to study and adhere to the promises expressed in the Rite of Confirmation. We must also keep in mind that each student has a unique developmental timeline, which God, who controls all things, also established." We believe that when a student is ready and makes the choice to take the step into confirmation, they will experience a deeper growth in and personal connection to the faith.

We are looking forward to guiding our youth down the same path we've all been following: to Worship, Grow, Serve, and Reach.

Camp Omega's Vision for Ministry

Are you familiar with Camp Omega? It is our Minnesota South District's Bible Camp located at the heart of our district in Waterville, MN. For over 50 years Camp Omega has been a place for children, teens, adults, families, and congregations to discover and rediscover the joy of being in relationship with Jesus. As campers of all ages encounter creation . . . create community . . . and commune with Christ, hearts are changed and participants return home with a revitalized and contagious faith that can't help but be shared with family, friends, and community. That is the power of camp!

As a ministry of the Minnesota South District, Camp Omega's purpose is to encourage, support, and enhance the ministries of our congregations through the unique resources found within a camp setting / ministry. It also provides a tremendous outreach opportunity to the campers and communities it serves. Did you know that 40% of those attending camp list no church or list a church that is not a Christian community?

While Camp Omega is one of a very few Bible camps in the country that has sustained growth over the last five years, we are losing more and more adult retreat opportunities. Why? Because the 175 beds are all bunk beds and the retreat center has shared bathroom facilities. While there is a great love for Camp Omega around the district, that same love is not shared for "bunk beds and shared bathrooms." That is why Camp Omega is \$1.3 million into a \$3.3 million dollar capital campaign to build a new Adult / Family Retreat Center. Over the next several months you will learn more about this project and how you can make a difference in support of this effort.

Liberty Ridge Campus!

Can you believe that the launch of the Liberty Ridge Campus is less than 8 months away? Time goes by fast! On February 5, 2017, Woodbury Lutheran is going to launch the Liberty Ridge Campus. But, there's a lot that needs to happen before the launch.

In the coming months, we are looking to assemble a launch community of 125 adults plus children. The launch community will be made up of individuals from both the Valley Creek and Oak Hill campuses. Over 20 adults have already made a commitment to be a part of the Liberty Ridge Campus. *Is God calling you?*

In the coming months, you will begin to hear more about Liberty Ridge in worship. In mid-July, we have a meeting with a company called Portable Church Industries, that will create a set to transform Liberty Ridge Elementary School into a space suitable for worship and kids ministry. In August, we'll bring on two part-time staff that will help lead both the worship and the kids and youth ministries at Liberty Ridge. The launch community will begin privately worshipping at the school on Sunday, January 15 and will continue to Sunday worship privately until the full launch on February 5.

We are already starting to do outreach in the neighborhoods surrounding Liberty Ridge Elementary School. In the end of July, a WLC couple who has committed to being a part of the launch community at Liberty Ridge will be hosting a free BBQ for their neighbors. The goal is to make connections with their neighbors and let them know of the launch of Woodbury Lutheran.

We are excited to see how God will make disciples and transform lives near Liberty Ridge Elementary through the Liberty Ridge Campus. If God is calling you to be a part of the new campus, or if you have questions, email me at kuehnej@woodburylutheran.org.

WLC Missionary Focus

JJ and Stephanie Wessman initially went to Israel in 2000 to work with a small ministry in Jaffa, and after two years they joined international mission organization, Operation Mobilization, and became part of OMI, the Operation Mobilization, Israel team. They spent 14 years in Israel ministering in different capacities.

JJ worked with a national youth ministry called **Netivah**. He did logistics for the youth, soldiers and youth workers conferences that are held monthly throughout the year. He enjoyed being a sounding board for new ideas and figuring out how to practically implement them. He was also on the OMI leadership team and enjoyed planning and leading short-term trips throughout Israel. Stephanie was on the leadership and teaching team for a single mother's/women's ministry called **Ot Oo'mofet** (Hebrew for "A Sign and a Wonder"). They conduct 5 month seminars based on the Tabernacle for believing women across the country to give them a better understanding of God and to give them the tools they need to break the cycle of problems in their lives. The goal is to move from the place of a victim to victor. They also provide training for congregations that are interested in starting women's ministry. JJ and Stephanie were both very involved in the leading of the Modi'in congregation (the local messianic church in their city). JJ was on the leadership team, the teaching rotation and facilitated the English home group and Stephanie worked with the Modiin youth.

Unfortunately, this ministry and life came to a screeching halt in June of 2014 when the Wessman's were asked by the Ministry of Interior to leave Israel. They packed up their house and the 5 kids and moved back to Woodbury. It has been 2 challenging years of readjustment for their family to a life in the USA, but God has been so good! Their eldest son just finished his first year at Northwestern University in Roseville, their second

child graduated from high school June 5, 2016 and she will be attending Colorado Christian University next year, and the younger 3 are attending St. Croix Prep. Academy and are adjusting quite well to school and life also.

JJ and Stephanie are continuing on with ministry here in Minnesota as representatives for OMI in the United States. JJ is working on developing a ministry which focuses on discipleship and mentoring, leading trips to Israel and teaching small groups and Sunday school classes on subjects ranging from the Biblical Feasts of Israel to Hebraic Roots to maps courses about scripture using biblical historical geography. He has also been working as a handyman over the last year as the ministry is in the growing stages. Stephanie is working at the kid's school in the Upper School as a Special Ed. Paraprofessional. She is involved in Young Lives, a ministry to teen mother's in the St. Croix Valley and teaches Bible studies predominately linking Old and New Testaments and on the Tabernacle. Once again Woodbury Lutheran is teaming with FMSC to pack a trailer load of meals at our Valley Creek location. Woodbury Lutheran has already packed 482,112 meals for children in Haiti and Nicaragua – this year's event will push that number to three-quarters of a million meals! Registration for the event will open in the middle of August, but please spread the word to family – friends – co-workers. Everyone is welcome to join us. Children as young as 5 can help as long as they are with their parents. Groups (scouts, sports teams, etc.) need to be in at least third grade to pack. And if you can't stand and pack you can sit and put labels on the food bags. Packing is fun, but most importantly, you will be putting food into the tummies of hungry children.

Living in the Church & State Tension focuses on what it means to be disciples of Jesus in America today. Oftentimes, we might try to approach political topics from our own opinions, ideologies, or systems. But what if we let our faith define how we acted and spoke about politics and political issues? Join Pastor and Concordia University professor, Mark Koschmann, as we dig deeper into politics, voting, war, social justice, and more.

The Story - Part I is the first part in a five part series on the book, *The Story*, an abridged chronological Bible that reads like a novel. There are no verse references, and Scripture segments are seamlessly woven together with transition text into a single, grand narrative. This class is great for those who are confused or overwhelmed with reading a normal Bible. It's also great for those who simply want to experience the Bible as a full narrative. Creating "Double Identity" for Your Grandkids

Tyler, Travis, and Tori had an uphill climb regarding their family identity. Their dad was adopted, and didn't know his biological origin. As a result he struggled with his identity. His relationship with his adoptive parents was strained, and then both of them passed away while the three kids were just toddlers.

Then their dad became emotionally uninvolved, and he drifted further out of their lives. A divorce followed. The three kids struggled with hurt and anger toward him and, frankly, didn't want to have his name as theirs.

Tyler, Travis, and Tori are my daughter Andrea's three children—my grandchildren.

Their grandmother and I wanted them to get identity from us. We talked to them about being part of our family; while they didn't bear our last name, they had our blood. We told them, "Being part of the 'Fowler line' is awesome!" We did what we could to create a strong sense of identity with our side of the family.

All kids need identity, don't they? If they don't find it in their family (the best scenario), they will create their own—in a group of their peers, or in unwise relationships. And as believers, we want our grandchildren to have double identity: as part of our family, and as part of God's family. If you're a grandparent, don't you want the same for your grandchildren?

So what establishes family identity? (Think both of your family and your local church.) Here are five elements:

UNCONDITIONAL LOVE

In our families, we need to not only love one another deeply, but we also need to express love to one another regularly. We're all pretty unlovable at times, but we hope our families will continue to love us no matter what! That is what families do—or ought to do. In your family, how are you doing at expressing unconditional love?

INCREDIBLE GRACE

Let's face it: it's often much easier to show grace to a stranger than it is to a family member. After all, families know one another, warts and all. But forgiveness (grace) bonds us together because we all fail each other at times. Do you need to extend grace to a family member?

UNMATCHED CLOSENESS

Developing deep relationships through "doing life together" is a critical part of creating family identity in both the church and at home. We have to laugh together, play together, and cry together to give our grandchildren a strong identity. That takes time and intentionality. How can you improve "doing life together" in your family?

COMMON BONDS

A shared interest, like camping or baseball, a family business, or ministering together—a common goal, or even a common pain or obstacle provides "glue" and gives identity. You've probably said it, and you've definitely heard it: "A family that prays together stays together." Whether it is praying together, attending church together, or engaging in another spiritual activity, the operative word is *together*. In your family, how would you describe the "glue" that holds you together?

A FAMILY HISTORY

The Word of God is "His story." It not only binds together believers all over the world, but also gives us a sense of identity. In the same way, our family history helps our grandkids know who they are. Passing on our family stories (even if our history includes some horse thieves and thugs) can help our grandkids "belong." In fact, a few "horse thief stories" will let children know they will still have family identity when they fail—and they will. Are you intentionally passing on your family history?

About Tyler, Travis, and Tori: They now have a new last name and a new family identity. Their mom eventually remarried, and their new dad, Paul, has become the father they never had. He has adopted them, loved them, guided them spiritually, and given them his name. Now they carry his identity. And more important: Their identity as Christ-followers is set as well. Double identity. They've got it, and we are thrilled!


