Sabbath

Sabbath is an old word. The dictionary informs us it is:

- The 7th day of the week observed from Friday evening to Saturday evening as a day of rest and worship by Jews and some Christians.
- Sunday observed among Christians as a day of rest and worship.
- A time of rest.

Two words summarize it as - worship and rest. Even in writing this a bit of longing for rest surfaced in me.

When I was a child Sundays were different than they are today. Very few stores were open and it seemed as if everyone was off work. Today Sundays are as active as any day. Yet Sabbath is still observed.

Saturday evenings and Sunday mornings are different than the rest of our week. We gather in a building to worship. Some people dress up for church. We sing together to live music. Candles are lit. There are often flowers at the Altar. Families and friends sit together facing the Altar. People kneel and some people stand to receive communion.

In a world where there's so much to do and so much to consume, Sabbath provides rest for the most important part of who we are – our souls.

There is a rhythm to our lives when we practice Sabbath. God gave us rhythms – the Seasons of the year, day and night and a time for activity and a time for rest. Sabbath is worship and rest.

So it seems that Sabbath is ceasing and celebrating. We celebrate in worship. We cease our work. We catch our breath. It is a time to take your gaze off sched-

ules and screens and look to God.

There are many ways to Sabbath. It's not necessary to cease moving your body. Find the things that while you do them, your soul rests. If it's gardening, garden. While you're in the garden, recall scripture that took place in a garden. If you enjoy painting, paint and recall the way God paints the sky at dawn and dusk. Call a friend or family member and catch up. Read a good book or the Bible. Go for a walk. Teach your children card games. Take a nap.



Over the next several months I would like to take some time with my newsletter articles to give some further insight into the values that make Woodbury Lutheran unique. Of course as followers of Jesus we have certain beliefs and practices that connect us to the wider body of Christ, but we also need to recognize that there are certain things about our gathering that make us unique from the church down the block. In the same way that each of us as individuals are a unique part of the body of Christ, so each gathering of Jesus followers is also unique.

One of my favorite parts of the fall is teaching the 9th grade testimony confirmation class. In this class each student shares a piece of their faith story in front of their peers. I am always amazed by what these students share and the way that they then rally around each other, it gives me a picture of why we value relationships so deeply at our church, it shows us all in a tangible way why life is better together.

It seems like this same value has become increasingly more difficult for adults to experience in our culture today. Ironically, even though we have access to more relationships than ever, most people feel like they have few deep relationships, which can make life lonely. One of the ways that we truly become more like Jesus is by experiencing deep, meaningful relationships with other disciples of Jesus, which is why you hear us consistently talking about the importance of being in a small group.

Last month I heard from a guy who reluctantly joined a small group after he could no longer stand the encouragement of his spouse :). He was dead set against the idea and was coming up with every excuse in the book to get out of it. Amazingly, after giving it a try and after several months of meeting, his attitude has completely changed and he actually

Dear Woodbury MobilePack Leadership Committee,

I'm not sure if that's what you call yourselves – I would probably call you the Woodbury Community Superstars! You are simply one amazing group of passionate volunteers and FMSC is blessed to know you.

Thank you for working tirelessly in the months leading up to your event to make the Woodbury MobilePack a huge success. Thank you for giving of yourselves during the event. Thank you for coming together as a team of community and civic leaders, business leaders, school leaders, and church leaders to feed God's kids. The **4,066,200 meals** packed will feed **11,140 kids** one meal per day for an entire year.

Below are stories of some of the kids who receive FMSC meals. Know you are making a huge difference in their lives.

- Lydia lives on the island of Marinduque in the Philippines. She has been receiving FMSC meals for 9 months. She went from being malnourished to what you see now. A very happy mom was sitting next to her.
- Agness and Richard live in Zambia. One of our partners found Agness who was abandoned by her mom and dad. At the age of 8 years old, Agness is caring for her 5 year old brother, Richard. Because of FMSC food, our partner is able to provide Agness a hot FMSC meal every day through their school feeding program. Each day Agness saves a part of her lunch to share with Richard who waits outside the gate. But, as an 8 year old head of household, Agness also goes home each night with a bag of FMSC food to prepare for her little family. When Richard is old enough to go to school, he, too, will receive his own hot meal every day.
- Nelson is from Haiti. Nelson captured my heart nearly two years ago when I traveled to Haiti to visit our partners there. On a routine trip to a village I had been to many times before, we found Nelson sitting naked among the pigs. He had literally been discarded by his family. One of our great partners asked permission to take him to their compound and feed him. Nelson has now become one of their adopted children and he is thriving! I can't wait to travel back to Haiti in January and spend some time with this precious little guy.

These three kids represent the hundreds of thousands of children you are helping us feed. May God bless you for being His hands and feet that allow FMSC and our partners to feed Lydia, Agness, Richard, Nelson, and many, many more beautiful kids all around the world.

Children's HopeChest in Ethiopia

Partnering With Children's HopeChest

This past October, Woodbury Lutheran Church engaged in a new mission partnership with [Children's HopeChest](#) in a Kingdom building endeavor to help transform Sendafa, an impoverished city in Ethiopia.

Much of Sendafa resides in slum conditions, in housing that is not conducive for living. Waterborne diseases are as common as clean, safe water is difficult to access. Many people in the community are unemployed and work as daily laborers or petty traders with little income to support their families. As a result, many of the children survive on less than one meal a day and do not attend school.

An Ethiopian named Sister Almaz Tarekegn has a bold vision and is leading the charge on the ground. Several years ago, she felt the Lord pushing her to start a school, Ekklesia Academy, for orphaned and vulnerable children as an entry point into the community to form relationships and to begin to tell people about Jesus.

Our community, through a partnership created by Children's HopeChest, will be sponsoring 145 kids at the school. This sponsorship enables the Ethiopia staff to preach the Good News of the gospel and assist people to become self-supportive community members. Children are served a daily meal throughout the school week and are provided with uniforms, shoes, and school supplies.

In addition to caring for orphaned and vulnerable children, there will be opportunities down the road to participate and fund-raise for initiatives aimed at transforming the larger community surrounding the school. Some examples include training people on various life skills (farming, sewing, hair-

dressing, etc.), installing wells for fresh water, and building a vocational center.

As a church, we will be making annual trips to serve and build relationships with the school staff, kids and larger community. Our next trip will be from February 20 – March 1.

We are thankful for your support, prayers and involvement in this important, Kingdom building work. We look forward to seeing how God uses and shapes the WLC and Ethiopian communities as this relationship grows over the years.

Wanted: People to Join the “Woodbury Ding-A-Lings”

For the 16th consecutive year Woodbury Lutheran Church (WLC) has accepted the challenge as an evangelical outreach ministry, to ring bells for the Salvation Army (SA) during the Christmas season of 2015. The funds collected will be used to assist the less fortunate residents of the Payne Avenue area of St. Paul.

To give you some idea of the impact our WLC Ding-A-Lings have made, the grand total for 2013 was \$ 12,202.50 and in 2014 \$19,340.55. Our participation in this program is making a difference for people that need Salvation Army assistance!

Known as the “Woodbury Ding-A-Lings”, we will be ringing the bells at both doors of the CUB store in Tamarack Village. We will ring in **2 hour time slots** from **8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.** every Friday and Saturday beginning **Friday, November 27** through **Saturday, December 19**.

Singles, families and groups are encouraged to ring. Youth under the age of 16 may ring with an adult, but those who are at least 16 years of age may ring without an adult along.

You may sign up to ring bells for a shift by going to the "Ding-A Ling" kiosk in the narthex between church services each weekend beginning Oct 31 / Nov 1.

Adopt - A - Kettle

Another feature will be the Adopt - A - Kettle. If you desire to help the SA but are unable to ring bells, you can elect to match the moneys collected in any kettle for either location, for any day, for any percent of a day's amount, or up to any dollar amount you choose.





Don't Judge A BOOK BY Its Cover

Recently my adult son shared a difficult conversation that he'd had with a much older co-worker. He said, "They really don't know how much experience I actually have. I think they're judging me by my cover and not taking the time to read the whole book!" The "judging"—although not acceptable—was understandable, since my son's arms are covered with tattoos.

My son's tattoos have become invisible to me, but this wasn't always my story. In my generation, tattoos were viewed as rebellious signatures or as something done on an inebriated whim. Since that time, such markings have become more mainstream. In fact, a 2014 Fox News poll discovered that 20 percent of all Americans have a tattoo, up from 13 percent in 2007. And the percentage goes up as the age goes down; one-third of people under age 30 have a tattoo—and one in five have three or more.

I have to agree with my son; there is much more to him than inked skin. There's much more to his "book" than simply the cover. He is a chosen child of God who loves Jesus and has given his life to Him. He is single-parenting with ferocious intent so his children will know that they're deeply loved and valued by God.

How often do we judge others based on visible displays of style that sometimes clash with what we deem appropriate? How do we view our children and grandchildren? Do we just look at the "cover"? Or do we take the time to read the book? Do we ask questions that help us discover where their identity lies? Do we value them simply because they are children of God?

We must remember that our adult children and grandchildren are bombarded with lies from this world that tell them they're unloved and unwanted. They don't need that from us as well. We need to view them through the clearest, most accurate lenses of all: the eyes of God. And when we do, we will see each one as someone precious, someone made in God's image, someone whose story is being written by God Himself—and someone who's much more than just the cover!
